A note from the Pastor - April 4, 2025

"The ravens brought him bread and meat in the morning and bread and meat in the evening, and he drank from the wadi." 1 Kings 17:6

Elijah was fed in the wilderness with bread and meat twice a day. He was attended by ravens. It is helpful for us to remember the context of this verse. God has just given Elijah the prophetic vision for the drought coming to the land reigned over by King Ahab. And then he sends Elijah to a place where there will be water and nourishment. We may also remember that Ellijah and King Ahab go head to head multiple times with the prophet sharing the word of God as judgment against the King. King Ahab and Queen Jezebel are worshippers of Baal and Asherah. The prophet Elijah proclaims the word of God against them as they require the worship of Ba-al and propagate the gospel of the fertility god and goddess. It is no



fertility god and goddess. It is no wonder that the Lord requires sole worship and that Ahab and Jezebel are enraged.

So, Elijah is directed to go far from the King in this time of judgment. This is a matter of life and death. To care for Elijah, God sends the ravens. Ravens were an interesting choice. Biblically, we see ravens as the first bird that Noah sends out to see if the waters have receded sufficiently. They are considered unclean in Mosaic law. In Proverbs and Revelation, raven also exact the judgment of the Lord. And then in 1st Kings, ravens are sent to feed and provide for Elijah. Sometimes care comes from unexpected places. Like the ravens, God may even send those we have not considered or regarded as unclean to care for us.

Some of you are providing physical and emotional care to loved ones in trying times in their lives. Some of you have been providing long term care for a loved one with limited mobility, treatments for chronic illnesses, and dementia or Alzheimer's. This is work done out of great love with endless hours and needs, and often little respite. Some of you are caring for growing family members, children or grandchildren, whose needs do not always fit your skill set or your energy level. This is work done out of great love with endless hours and needs, and often little respite. Caregiving is an incredible gift given to a family member or beloved one. It gives of your time, emotional capacity, endless problem solving, skills, and resources. On a particular note, I remind you not to forget your own physical needs of food, water, sleep, and different focus.

I recently saw an episode of the new show, "The Pitt" which is about an emergency medical network set in the city of Pittsburgh. It had been recommended to me multiple times. I found some time to watch, and there was an interesting storyline about a daughter caregiving for her mother. The mother has come into the emergency room with some minor lacerations after a fall. The daughter is exhausted from caregiving. When the daughter goes to drive the car around to pick up her mother, she falls asleep in the car. However, there is no knowledge of this in the emergency room, and they have fears of the mother being abandoned. The healthy conversation that follows about caregiver fatigue is refreshing and accurate to real life.

Perhaps, you are in a season where you need to hear the voice of God say to you, "even though there may be challenges ahead, pause by the wading for water and let yourself be fed by the ravens." Do not

just wait for this season to conclude. In the center of the hard work and endless hours, find rest and nourishment. It may come from the most unusual places. And when it comes, do not turn it away or say it is not needed. Accept it with grace and be present in the refreshment no matter how long it is.

For all of you who are caregiving, I pray that there may be ravens amid your exhaustion who care for you while you care for someone else. We serve a God who cares for us and reveals God's character of compassion and inclusion while doing it. May God's grace be known to you.



Last Saturday, Stroudsburg UMC and Pastor Monica were recognized by the Annual Conference with the Herbert E. Palmer Award.





Racial microaggressions and spirituality among African Americans in Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania

I want to thank my community for helping me serve marginalized people. With your help, this research will bring awareness to many people. I would like to briefly give you a glimpse into my subject.

The study will focus on the experiences of racial microaggression faced by African Americans in Stroudsburg Pennsylvania, highlighting how individual and collective resources inform coping mechanisms and promote well-being. Due to the subtleness and hidden coded messages contained in racial microaggression, Psychology Today defines a racial microaggression as "racial microaggressions are the brief and everyday slights, insults, indignities and denigrating messages sent to people of color by well-intentioned white people who are unaware of the hidden messages being communicated". Thus, my experiences suggest that in some predominately white circles and other cultures that are exposed to or have been indoctrinated to believe in stereotypes identified with African Americans racial microaggression is known and seen as the racial identity of African Americans.

Relevant scholarship on these subjects and personal interviews with study participants will reveal how members of this community deal with racialized trauma and distress. The study hypothesizes that these experiences and the adaptive and maladaptive mechanisms in response are deeply shaped by gender and participation in religious and civic institutions. I wish to argue that spirituality and collective religious practices promote healing and well-being in this community. Blessings to you all and thank you








The Education Society of EPA offers Higher Education Grants





April 26th, we will be hosting the Lay Academy class on prayer.



HELP. THANKS. WOW. The most common prayers we utter are single words. Personal prayer is often




VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

SOUP KITCHEN UPDATE - JANUARY 2025

For the last year, we have seen the number of hungry people increase. Our Soup Kitchen has been feeding hungry people for decades. We also notice that often, towards the end of the month, the number of meals served increases. Many people receive their compensation at the beginning of the month. Stretching into the end of month with rent, utilities, and unforeseen expenses can be difficult. What began as a vital way to include our neighbors and affirm their dignity shifted in pandemic times to a drive-by meal and has returned to a sitdown, eat-in meal with community connections. Each week, different groups prepare and serve a meal. From the scouts to local churches, food pantries, family groups, and friends, plan a meal and serve it on Sunday from 2pm - 3pm. Sometimes, we can smell Sunday dinner from the sanctuary as we conclude the 11:00 service. I am so thankful for each of the groups that serve our neighbors. I am grateful for each one of our neighbors who has come in. In 2024, we shared over 4,300 meals with our neighbors.
